California Capital Book Festival By Mary Lou Anderson

A panel at the California Capital Book Festival organized by Margie Yee Webb included members of local writing clubs.

We all proudly discussed our organizations, what they offered, and reasons people should join. We told of the many benefits, the locations, the times. We all gave our spiel and shared handouts with pertinent info. When I made a statement encouraging writing; another panel member said, "I have to use that."

My words were, "When you get tired of the lousy scripts

and boring television shows, turn off the TV and write your stories. They will be better than what you were wasting your time watching."

To be honest, I wasn't talking to the the audience.

This season's television offerings are now released and some old favorites are back. *Castle* offers an idealized version of a writer; many of us are faithful watchers of *SVU*, *Chicago Fire* and *PD*, *The Big Bang Theory*, and other shows that have been carried over from previous seasons. This year's new offerings include the intriguing *Forever*, *Madam Secretary*, *Bad Judge*, and other new shows.

Some of these may be worth watching. We all need some diversion from reality since too often real life stinks. However, plots are too often repetitive, reiterated from previous seasons, years, even decades old. Some of the new shows are downright boring, offering nothing new but mindless nonsense that numbs the mind.

My usual practice is to watch the new season's premiers to see what is worth watching, then often leave the TV on even while I'm writing. Background noise of the TV can drown out the issues of real life, covering the sadness of wars, murders, fights, losing teams, even the silence of an empty house while others are at work, school, or have moved on with their lives. TV mellows the soul, filling the voids of existence.

Maybe it really *deadens* the soul.

I wasn't talking to the audience at the Book Festival about lousy scripts and boring television shows — I was talking to *myself*. I've got to turn off the telly, or at least turn the volume down ... *way* down.

Are you experiencing the same thing? Are you letting brainless gibberish rob you of precious time, preventing you from completing your sentences, paragraphs, pages,

SSWC Anthology Project for 2015 By Tom Hessler

We have agreed to produce an anthology to be published in the summer of 2015. The primary purposes of the anthology are to encourage our members to write and to provide an opportunity for those who have yet to publish their work in a bound volume. All members, published and unpublished, are welcome to submit unpublished works to showcase the best of the talent SSWC has to offer.

Intent is to include short story fiction, non-fiction pieces of general interest, and poetry. In the past we have accepted chapters, extracts, of unpublished works by our authors. Because we are encouraging fresh writing, we will not accept such extracts for 2015. Also, to promote fresh writing, we encourage the authors to submit current works. If you have not written in the last year, we would expect your submission to be a new work, written in the year prior to March of 2015.

Your Anthology Committee will review the material and return same for corrections if required. Each submission, except poetry, should contain from 500 to 5000 words. Up to three written works may be submitted by each author and several from one author <u>may</u> be included in the volume with the understanding that the first priority will be to have as many authors included as possible. Only one long (3000 - 5000 words) submission is allowed per author.

Prior to submission, be sure to have your work reviewed. One of the best means of doing this is through a critique group.

- The work will have been reviewed for spelling, grammar, and punctuation by a person competent to do so prior to submission. There are club members who will assist you for a fee if you like.
- We strongly suggest that the submission be reviewed by a critique group. In doing so, besides making correction for above errors, the critique group may point out structural problems with plot, and suggest changes in characterization, characters dialogue, narrative, and other elements of style.
- Do not expect the anthology committee to provide the above editing service for you. If writing errors are substantial, the work might not be accepted.

The committee will only accept submissions in electronic form. It is unreasonable to expect the committee to retype the work to get it into electronic format for publishing.

- Below is a proposed schedule for the Anthology Project:
- Submissions should be in the hands of the committee by the March SSWC meeting (March 9, 2015). Material may be submitted earlier; if so, it will be reviewed (and returned) earlier.
- The committee will review all submittals by April 1, 2015. If submittals require editing, they will be returned with comments indicating such. The committee will not make the corrections.
- If corrections are required, the author will have until May 1, 2015 to return the material.
- The committee will make final selections and organize the anthology by June 1, 2015.
- The committee will produce a proof copy for review by each author. The authors will have a week after receipt of the proof to review their own work. Only minor editing changes are possible at this time, no rewrites. After proof copy review, it would be the intent to have the final copies available by August, 2015.

A check for \$10 made out to 'SSWC' must be given to the treasurer or member of the Anthology Committee on or before March 9. This will cover the cost of a proof copy of the anthology for each author to review for corrections and to help defray costs of paper, ink, final cover design. *If your work is not accepted, the amount of the check will be refunded.*

In association with this project, we would like to have interested members submit ideas for a title and a cover design in either a descriptive or sketch mode. That design and title suggestion should be submitted by April 1.

So, get writing. You may contact any of the Anthology Committee members if you have questions. We will provide updates as time goes by.


