Computer Tips for Quotation Marks

If you are an internet author or internet article marketer and use MS Word to compose your work, you must turn off "Smart Quotes" in MS Word before copying and pasting to publish your works on the internet. Don't worry. It's easy. Keep reading and you'll find out how and why.

One of the beneficial features of using MS Word, to compose articles, is the many Auto Correct features offerred in the program. You can word search and type away and most of the minor mistakes like "teh" instead of "the" are instantly corrected without your even noticing. Thank you very much! But, if you copy and paste your work from MS Word into a text editor for eventual publication on the internet AND your work includes "quotes", you may develop a problem.

MS Word has a feature that automatically converts the "keystroke to the appropriate angle depending on whether it begins or finishes a statement. This feature is called Smart Quotes. It makes your sentences look very pretty with the curlies all going in the correct direction. And; when you copy and paste your Auto-Corrected text into a text editor, it APPEARS to be just fine. However; when the HTML document is opened in a browser, these little "smart" characters can be as misunderstood. You will often see a funny little "?" sign where your quote mark should have been.

There is a simple fix and I am going to share it with you.

1. Open MS Word. You don't need to open a document.

2. Mouse click the "File" tab in the top left corner. This takes you to the MS Office Backstage.

3. Mouse click the "Options" option, which is almost at the bottom of the list. The Options window will pop up.

4. Mouse click "Proofing" on the left side.

5. In the right-side panel, look for the AutoCorrect Options button. Click it. The multi-tabbed, AutoCorrect box will appear.

6. Select the AutoFormat tab. Under "Replace:", uncheck the "Straight Quotes" with "Smart Quotes" box. Part 1 is done. One step down and one to go.

Note: Stay in the AutoCorrect box.

7. Select the "AutoFormat As You Type" tab. Under Replace as You Type, uncheck the "Straight Quotes" with "Smart Quotes" box. 8. While you are here, you might glance at all the other options selected and uncheck any you don't like. You will probably want to keep Internet and Network Paths with Hyperlinks. The rest are up to you.

9. Click OK at the bottom and you are done.

Now you ask, "So, what if I have already saved documents in MS Word with Smart Quotes on?"

The easiest way to do this is to use the Replace feature in MS Word. You can find this feature on the Home tab at the far right. Select Replace and enter what you want to find (") and what you want to replace it with (") and then select Replace All.
