In November I requested stories or anything from the past, what was going on when each of us joined the club, something reflective of where we've been.


This is our 60th year as SSWC starting January 2015. SOoo you still have the chance to send me something for the newsletter! OH, Joy of Joys!

ARE PLEASED TO PRESENT OUR MENTOR AND FRIEND, Maya Kaathryn Bonhoff, As featured speaker at the December meeting of the Suburban Writers Club.

The following biography is reproduced as it appeared in "Analog" magazine, Mid-December, 1990



If you're just plain Mary Elaine in Nebraska and can't throw a stone without hitting another Mary E—somebody, Maya Kaathryn is a swell collection of letters for a rock singer and *Analog* author. Bohnholf was taken from the band's flutist during a marriage ceremony.

As an army brat, Maya just happened at birth to be in Davis, CA. Her dad was a tech sergeant in the air force who had taken time out to study agronomy at a local college in preference to going to OCS. This trained farmer was then transferred to a desert base in Rabot, Morocco until Maya was five. She still sees the place whenever she reads *Dune*. Stateside posts included Offut Strategic Air Command near Omaha, NE. There, her older sister took off to try a career as a concert planist. Mom had been a forties" forch singer in Hollywood.

Alter Nam, dad chose SAC headquarters duty over the Pentagon. Maya became a full-fledged horse-crazy, football-cheerin', choir-singin' daughter of the corn belt. At filleen she went back to California, got deep into music, discovered the Bahai faith, and dropped out of college to join a Bahai-oriented folk-rock band as a singer. A free wheeling California life-style lasted as long as the gigs did, and then a full-time job on the assembly line at an electronics plant, with small-time weekend gigs. A voracious reader, she had also been doodling word sketches since she was a child. She treated school writing assignments like a sell-determined honors course.


Analog authors always have early reading and writing backgrounds, and nearly always a life-long love for SF. Along the way, there is always lots of practice writing. Writers are born; authors are made. Maya turned out a giant novel that didn't sell, then thought about writing until everything came together —plots meshed with techniques joined with characterization. Hard science for an Analog story was harder, but she had help from some good astronomy texts. She is most interested in exploring the "self" of her characters, fitting them into their created worlds. As a Bahai adept, she feels the future is there, ready for people to grasp and shape.

For Maya, writing is not an artisan's blacksmithing trade, but more of a mystical experience in visualizing and creating new existences. From someplace inside, her fingers take dictation to put words on paper. The fingers may be blacksmithing, but it is elemental fire that does the shaping. She follow's Ray Bradbury's advice to get the feelings down on paper and then goes back for the final word selection. First draft is longhand, followed by word-processing for a final edit onto a laser printer.

Writing is now full-time, with notebooks and writing pads always at hand, notwithstanding a 9-5 job designing software-training for computers. Stories are mostly SF, with some fantasy and probably a mystery or two coming up. A first Analog appearance was in "Brass Tacks," just like Lester Del Rey and some other authors. Then came "Hand-Me-Down Town" in Mid-Dec., 1989. Maya agrees with the assessment that non-SF, tagged "mainstream fiction," really is a self-limited subset of the greater universe of SF. As a science fiction writer, she can explore areas closed to more parochial writers.

It is much easier to sell, often takes less time to research and write—especially articles, but still employs fiction techniques and vibrant language. No matter what your interest, professional background or hobby, there are corresponding markets.

Write what you know. Consumer markets cover animals, aviation, art, child care, home and garden, health, military, photography, self-improvement, religious, retirement, sports, travel and dozens of others. Trade journals feature everything from advertising to zoos. Newspapers and Sunday Supplements offer opportunity and greeting card publishers beckon to the poets among us.


