




IF ALL COMMUNICATIONS ARE SUSPECT, ARE NOT MY OWN?

As individuals, we know rather little about one another, even though we eat and work together, live under the same roof, and even lie next to each other. When evaluating ourselves, as well as others, our mind's eye is diverted, indeed blurred, by the private wishes and personal fantasies that make us the individual personalities we are. Thus, there remains a distinct difference between how others perceive us and the way we experience ourselves.

Apparently, everything that provides for us illusions of perpetuity, familiarity, knowledge, and intimate insightfulness of ourselves are deceptions designed to reassure us, perceptions with which we try to ward off intellectual assaults on our emotionally vulnerable psyches. Actually, we should be grateful for the protection those deceptions afford us, and the application thereof, that guards us from the strangeness of each other.

Is anyone an authority on themselves? The stories others tell about you and the stories you tell about yourself–which come closer to the truth? In such stories, is there really a difference between true and false when we try to understand someone on the inside? Are the secret vaults of our minds places of facts, or only storehouses of the deceptive shadows and pretenses of our stories?

When we talk about ourselves, or about others, we subtly reveal ourselves in our words.

Attempting to show what we think and feel, we inadvertently allow others a glimpse into our psyche, though few seem to consciously recognize the fact. For not only do we reveal ourselves with our words, but at the same time we also betray ourselves by constantly reveal much more than what we wanted to. Furthermore, other people too often interpret our words as indications of something we ourselves may not even be aware of.

I think it is quite true that when we meet people we actually experience, real-time, both the positive and negative echoes and pretenses borne of our imaginations. Given the foregoing, it seems to me, that people who would really like to know themselves would have to guard themselves against inner negative truths amongst which are self-disappointments. For instance, self-disappointments may abound about a lack of courage, the sheer amount of dishonesty you employ when hiding from the prying minds of others, or the incredible narrowness of people's feelings, acts, and words. All these things lead back to the same question—what was it we really expected, and hoped for, from ourselves? Why do we know so little about our own fantasies? What do we know of someone else's fantasies? What could we know, if we know nothing of the images passed to him/her by their imagination?

Everything we experience is instantly the past, and accessible only as small disarrayed remnants of memories that tend to surge forward, then die out again. These recalled fragments are what we use to think about ourselves. It is an inherent, natural way of thinking. So, when others stand before us, how should their stories be thought of if not in the form of interpretations from our personal internal episodes of memory, our own exclusive reality. Man's chronicling of facts and events, along with his inherent ego urge to embellish them, have coexisted as long as man's language has been in existence. Anyone attempting to be objectively accurate has to intellectually, and consciously, fight his own inherent instincts to put a spin on whatever is his commentary.

It is an inalienable facet of human nature.

GERMAN-AMERICAN DAY By Bill Ainley

Many Americans look forward to the arrival of October's "Columbus Day," a national holiday and a three day weekend, and Oktoberfest, celebrated on various week-ends in October. For many years Oktoberfest has been a tradition in Germany, brought over to America by Servicemen/women returning from military duty in that nation. Unlike "Columbus Day" Oktoberfest is not an official holiday, celebrated in the spirit of fine German beer, wines, food, dancing and music.

What most Americans do not know is October 6th, coinciding with Oktoberfest, is the official "German-American Day" signed into law by President Ronald Reagan in 1983.

October 6th recognizes the arrival to Philadelphia in 1683 of 33 Mennonite and Quaker men, women, and children from the Lower Rhineland of Germany, known in history books as the "Thirteen Families of Krefeld" This group, related in one form or the other, established the village of Germantown in German Township; later came the villages of Krefeld, Summerhausen, and Krisheim.

The arrival of these religiously persecuted Germans were the precursor to thousands upon thousands of German immigrants flooding into Philadelphia and German Township from the Palatines of Germany, so much so that after several years, Benjamin Franklin wrote "I fear Pennsylvania could become a German speaking colony!" However, the majority of Palatine immigrants did not stay in Philadelphia. Thousands traveled west and south, settling throughout Pennsylvania, Virginia, and the Carolinas, where through great personal and physical sacrifice, countless founded productive farms and businesses.

In this day and age many Americans are not aware of at least one German ancestor. According to statistics upward of 75% of America's families has at least one. I too was one of these Americans, never realizing German ancestors until investigating my ancestors. Chances are, you have a famous or not so famous German ancestor, but until you know for sure, join with those that do, kick-off Oktoberfest by celebrating German-American Day on October 6th!

From Mort Rumberg

Here's a bit of info from the Writers of the Future newsletter, good advice for any genre. Mort

This information is from an interview with Dave Wolverton, the Writers of the Future Contest Coordinating Judge and Editor for the annual anthology. Past articles cover topics on what our judges are looking for in submissions.

These are answers to the question, "What are some of the most common errors that he finds in submissions?"

The following are summaries of Dave's answers:

"Originality is the key element to a story being selected as a finalist in this Contest. It always has been and always will be. You need to come up with fresh ideas to be a successful writer, so we are looking for those who have their own imagination."

90% of story flaws: Your story must also "resonate" with the reader. Main problems are that either the setting or character description are lacking. The reader does can not gather enough information to know where you are, the circumstances, or the character is barely described.

Other flaws: "The idea is not new, or the "Œworld" that the story is situated in needs to be more thought out."
