I am author of three published books so far.

"Bottlekatz, A Complete Care Guide for Orphan Kittens" is my award-winning first book, is used as a training manual for rescue groups throughout the US and UK, and shares lessons leaned from over 20 years of rescuing and raising bottle-fed kittens.



"From Hindsight to Insight; A Traditional to Metaphysical Memoir" was born of my desire to share a deeply held conviction that nothing in our lives is an accident, and that we receive subtle guidance throughout our lives. The idea quickly took on a life of its own until the book was completed. This book was originally published under the title "... and the Good Lord Remains Anonymous."

"Faces of Rescue; Cats, Kittens and Great Danes" was just released. This book contains stories about rescued kittens, cats, and Great Danes as well as about the people who do rescue work. The book also contains over 80 full-color pictures of animals I've known through the years. I'm also working on another book which I anticipate will be completed and published next year, so stay in touch.
