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#### **SSWC Member Profile**

Casinos dislike people who know a lot about gambling. That's why SSWC member John Powell uses the pseudonym John Marchel, under titles such as 101 Casino Gambling Tips, How to Play Winning Blackjack, and Gambler Proverbs.

Marchel has compiled an impressive list of credits since he retired from the McClellan Air Force Base in Sacramento in 1995. He is the editor of *The Gaming Bulletin*, a monthly internet newsletter. He wrote a chapter in *The History of Gambling in America*. The textbook is part of a casino management essentials series which is used in various colleges throughout the country.



Dorling Kindersley Company asked Marchel to write the gambling guide titled KISS Guide to Gambling.

John Marchel's latest book Bet You Didn't Know-Court Cards is about the history of court cards. The chapbook is published by Four Suites and is available to purchase this month. Marchel established Four Suites Publishing when he self-published his first book.

These credits are only a few of his achievements. With such an impressive platform, I was curious to know what was the secret to his prolific writing career. This is what he said:

I am working on many writing projects all the time. If one is not working for me, I just move to another project. Then that project seems like a new and interesting thing. I've never experienced writers block... Last year, I was writing for four magazines, so I had no chance to get writers block.

Can you describe your creative process?

I'm always alert for interesting gambling ideas. I'll read something in a magazine or a newspaper, or I'll hear something on TV or on the radio. If it sounds unusual, I write it down and do a little research. When I find out that it is interesting and there aren't many people who know about it, I do more research.

Who helped you critique and edit *Bet You Didn't Know–Court Cards*?

With Bet You Didn't Know a friend of mine who has a masters in writing reviewed it.

My SSWC critique group...has been exceptionally helpful in another one of my projects, Gambling Stories Told Here...Some True. That book is a series of forty-eight short stories about events in the past dealing with gambling.

My critique group has encouraged me to make small and large changes, which improved the manuscript. Today I wouldn't submit anything until an outside group or person critiqued it.

Overall I think to be a writer is a great occupation. You really have no boss looking over your shoulder. You set your own hours, you can write in your pajamas, and you can take a break any time you want. There is very little overhead needed to start your writing business. And once in a while you get paid for doing something you enjoy.

### **How To Use CreateSpace** by L. Paul Turner

An Introduction to get you involved and learning to do it yourself.

I'm not an expert on how to use CreateSpace. I've used their paid services twice. I have not tried their free service, mainly because I was timid and unsure of myself, and also because the free choices of book interior looked a bit plain. Yet, for my book of poetry, plain main be best. I'll decide later, when I have it ready to sell.

To find out which service, free or paid you want to use, first, go online to www.createspace.com. There you will see a bar that states: Start a title for free. Click it. Explore it.

You'll see a lot of options, from how to format your book with various fonts and typefaces that are offered, to a list of sizes your book can be printed in.

You may choose to have your own cover art, or you can use CreateSpace services for a fee, to make cover art for you. I believe I used a jpeg drawing for my cover.

You also get to choose modes of distribution. I chose "expanded distribution," because I wanted to sell in Europe and other places. Be sure to pick a standard size book, if you want expanded distribution.

With expanded distribution, you get your book on other continent's Amazon affiliate websites. You can also choose the in-store distribution as an added help. This is not where each store will carry one or two of your books. No, it's not that good. In-store distribution means that if a potential customer goes to their favorite bookstore, and if that bookstore is served by Ingram, a longtime book distributor, then the potential customer can order your book to be sent to that favorite bookstore for purchase.

Going back to the start page. You could choose the other button, the one that says: Explore paid services. This will be a journey where you have access to CreateSpace help. Here, you can have someone help you with the look of your book's interior, the paragraph look, the typeface, what kind of heading you want on each page. They can also help you find a suitable cover, one done by one of their artists. And, they can size your book for you, and put your file into the book form and make it work. In free services, you have to do this yourself.

Under paid services you can get an editor to look over your book. You can also pay CreateSpace to write a review for you, one you may wish to print on the back of your book cover.

Now why would CreateSpace want you to take advantage of their service for no charge? I suspect it is because they are associated with Amazon.com, and maybe they get a contracted for percentage of each sale, like a fee from Amazon.com. This is because when you have your book on Amazon, you get a percentage of the sale price. Amazon takes their share. Maybe CreateSpace gets a bit of that share.

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If you have questions, CreateSpace is helpful in its blogs. However, if you need specific help, you will probably be best served by taking one of their many options for service. They have a number of choices to fit your needs. You can pay nothing, pay a little, or pay a lot. Take a look. You can get your book on Amazon at no cost.
