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New Year's Resolutions, Anyone? Mary Lou Anderson

As writers, we are constantly urged to write every day. The typical suggestions are to journal, add something to your novel on a schedule, allot time to writing, yadda, yadda, yadda.

Try something new, *in addition* to the above, of course. Here are a few challenges for you. Take your pick. Try any one ... or all of them. It's up to you. But the only way to have something accomplished, something done, something printable, is to actually write something in a form that can be saved, printed, and even published. Here goes:

- o Try a poem a day. Too much? Try a poem a week. You'll end up with 52 poems done by the end of the year.
 - Write (or re-phrase) a joke you remember from your youth ... or read or heard somewhere.
- See a news article that sticks in your head? Write a piece of flash fiction (a few hundred words or less). Do this whenever the urge hits you ... but strive for at least once a week.
- Observe someone quirky at a store, along the street, at work ... anywhere. Write a description of him/her and create a scene involving that person.
- Had a strange dream last night? Would it make a good plot, a portion of a story, or include a good character? Race to the computer and make notes before the memory fades away never to be retrieved.
- The holidays are over. Write a few words about something interesting that happened around the dinner table. (Change the names, of course, so your relatives will continue to speak to you.)
- Create a conversation between your pet (cat, dog, goldfish?) and another animal that you saw (a squirrel in your yard, a bird flying overhead, the mold in your fridge?).
- Write a title for a new story. Set it aside. Next day, write another title. Keep doing that until
 one sticks then write the story instead of new titles.
 - o Pause the television during a scene and write a description of what's there.

No guarantees that what you write will be publishable and make you rich, but it just might help hone your writing skills.
