MARCH 11 MEETING — WHERE TO FIND YOUR NEXT GREAT IDEA




MAKERS

Dictionary Fascination

As a historical dictionary, the Oxford English Dictionary explains words by showing their development rather than merely their present-day usages. Therefore, it shows definitions in the order that the sense of the word began being used, including word meanings which are no longer used. Each definition is shown with numerous short usage quotations; in each case, the first quotation shows the word's first recorded instance that the editors are aware of. In the case of words and senses no longer in current usage, the last quotation is the last known recorded usage. This allows the reader to get an approximate sense of the time period in which a particular word has been in use, and additional quotations help the reader to ascertain information about how the word is used in context, beyond any explanation that the dictionary editors can provide.

As a historical dictionary, the OED is very different from those of current English, in which the focus is on present-day meanings.

The more I read about it, the more fascinated I become.


