Rules To Writing Good

Mort Rumberg

- 1) Prepositions are not words to end sentences with. It is not something you want your readers to learn from.
- 2) Avoid clichés like the plague. Not only are they old hat, but they leave much to be desired, so stick to your guns and stay on the straight and narrow path or your writing will stick out like a sore thumb.
- 3) Always be more or less specific in your writing. Writers should never, ever generalize.
- 4) Don't be redundant. Don't use more words than necessary to get your point across, explain a situation in excessive detail, or enhance an explanation beyond the minimum required to convey the meaning. Excessive use of unnecessary words is often highly superfluous, pretentious, verbose, and long-winded, and literally wastes words.
- 5) Don't exaggerate. Realize that exaggeration is a million times worse than understating and can often lead to being a masterpiece of insignificance.
- 6) Who needs rhetorical questions? They are overly melodramatic, pompous, and abstract, if not bombastic.

And finally...
