
Dimensions By Celia Glacken Winner of the Most Compelling Story


Why We Tell Stories

Last week I discovered that in 1903, a writer, William Wallace Ingraham, had written about my family history. Not finding a real copy, I found a reprint on Amazon and immediately bought it.

I came across this book because my grandfather, in the early days of the internet, spent countless hours on genealogy forums, networking and hunting down phone numbers of people and places on the east coast. He ended up compiling all this information and passed it down to us.

Because of his work, I learned the Castle family dates back to at least 1635 when Henry Castle, at the age of 22, sailed across the Atlantic to a New World he had never seen and settled in Stratford, Connecticut. While there are so many important figures, a couple to note: Captain Willaim Castle served nobly for the Union in the 11th regiment of the Missouri Cavalry; Edmund Castle served as Master of Corpus Christi College in Cambridge; and David Castle, though honorable, sided with the loyalists during the Revolutionary War.



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Writing Tip from the Grammar Guardian:

Meanings and Connotations

I heard from a fan who was reading my book (Yay!). Okay, okay, it was my sister. And she pointed out an error that everyone else had missed in two, 2, yes, TWO critique groups.

(Oopsies!)

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It can be rationalized that it was a minor, yet technical, error, but it was something that jumped out at her. And anything that makes a reader stop even for a moment is something that you should not include in your writing. (Like, maybe, even starting a sentence with a conjunction. ... Or, for that matter, using incomplete sentences.)

Okay, enough of that. The error was simple. I used "altitude" instead of "elevation" for information about the small, non-existent town of Cricket Creek in my *Sierra Heist* book.

What? Elevation and altitude are not synonyms? (Or should that be synonymous?) They both use distance above sea level, after all.

Well, elevation is usually used as the height of a point on the ground ... as in the height of (or on) a hill or mountain. Driving through a town and seeing the information sign, they include the elevation. (This was my mistake — I used altitude.)

Altitude is usually used when talking about the distance above sea level and is measured from the air, as in an airplane flies at an altitude of 30,000 feet.

Learn something new every day. Yep, a good thing to keep in mind, and an easy fix on Kindle.


